 - This conference brings together a collaborative scientific community of faculty, students, practitioners, and scholars to advance and support research on the science of well-being and optimal human functioning.
 - We are accepting podium-oral presentations, symposia, workshops, and poster submissions to the 8th Western Positive Psychology Association Conference.
 - Proposals must be submitted by January 15, 2024 111:59 PM PST.
 - To submit, you will need:
 - Presentation title (10-14 words)
 - Abstract of 150-250 words, your name, (and co-presenters if applicable), academic institution(s) and/or organization affiliation(s), plus preferred presentation format
 - If you are submitting a symposium, the corresponding author first will submit the symposium title followed by the symposium abstract and additional presenters.
 - The symposium chair and each presenter then provide their abstracts under separate submissions.
 - The chair is responsible for participant communication.
 - Abstracts will be reviewed by our academic committee team from Claremont Graduate University, University of New Mexico, WPPA, and California State University. Accepted participants will be notified by January 23, 2024.

New Mexico Youth with Opioid Use Disorder Are Unable to Access Evidence-Based Treatment in the Form of Medication for Addiction Treatment (MAT)

<u>Problem</u>: Youth substance use, addiction, and death is a growing crisis and it is exceedingly difficult for youth to gain access to evidence-based treatment

<u>Solution</u>: Support a bill being introduced in the New Mexico Legislature that would expand evidence-based treatment for opioid use disorder (OUD) for adolescents in New Mexico

The Opioid Epidemic is Increasingly Affecting Youth

- The overall diagnosis rate for OUD among youth rose nearly 6-fold between 2001 and 2014.
- Nearly 12x as many adolescents suffer from OUD each year than are diagnosed with cancer.
- Overdose deaths among adolescents have increased by more than 100% since 2019.
- Two-thirds of individuals in treatment of OUD report their first use was before the age of 25, and one-third report that it was before the age of 18.
- Rates of overdose death disproportionately affect Native American and Latinx communities in New Mexico.
- Rates of overdose death also disproportionately affect rural communities in New Mexico.

MAT is Evidence-Based Treatment for OUD, but Access is Limited

• MAT used to treat adolescents with OUD is endorsed by the American Academy of Pediatrics, American Society of Addiction Medicine, Society for Adolescent Health and Medicine, World Health Organization, and National Institutes of Health.

New Mexico Youth with Opioid Use Disorder Are Unable to Access Evidence-Based Treatment in the Form of Medication for Addiction Treatment (MAT) (cont.)

- MAT is associated with reduced all-cause mortality, fewer relapses to opioid use, enhanced recovery and retention in addiction care, reduction in the spread of infectious diseases like HIV and hepatitis C, and improved overall mental health.
- The average parent would need to call 29 facilities in the U.S. before finding one that provides MAT to patients 16 years or younger.
- Less than 5 substance abuse treatment programs in New Mexico offer or allow adolescents to utilize MAT.
- Youth detention centers in New Mexico also do not consistently provide MAT to youth with OUD.
- Collectively, these policies put adolescents at increased risk for continued addiction into adulthood, overdose, and death.

Action You Can Take as a Medical Student

- Call your local legislators and encourage them to support or co-sponsor this bill when it is filed.
- Sign up to give public commentary during hearings on the bill.
- Write an op-ed on the topic.
